Canada – 100th meeting of the Canadian Dermatology Association, Halifax

In June, I travelled to Halifax, Nova Scotia, for the Canadian Dermatology Association's centennial meeting. This was a more intimate gathering, with around 900 participants, yet it

Together, we represent an extraordinary network that can advance dermatology globally while respecting the unique perspectives of each region.

United States – AAD Innovation Academy, Chicago

Later in the summer, I attended the Innovation Academy AAD's Chicago, together with our Secretary General and Treasurer. While smaller in scale, this meeting offered meaningful opportunities to connect. Of particular interest was the Unity Summit, which brought together around 60 leaders of state dermatologysocieties and sister organisations. The Canadian Society and EADV were the only international invitees to attend the Summit. The discussions centred on strategies, themes and collective actions, reinforcing the importance of dialogue across borders. This model of unity and collaboration resonated strongly with me and will form part of the focus of the President's Symposium at our upcoming Congress in Paris, France.

Executive Committee and presidential visits

Beyond external meetings, the work of the Academy has continued. The

Executive Committee met in person in Lugano, Switzerland, in July, followed by an online session in August to ensure continuity and progress on our strategic objectives. I also undertook a visit to our offices in Lugano during August, where I was able to meet with staff and review preparations for the busy months ahead. These encounters, both formal and informal, reaffirm the dedication of everyone involved in ensuring that the Academy serves its members effectively.

Looking Ahead – Paris Congress

As we turn our focus toward the future, anticipation is building for our Congress in Paris. Early indications suggest that this will be our largest Congress yet, bringing together colleagues from around the world for an extraordinary programme of science, learning and exchange. The sense of "togetherness" that has defined my travels this year will also be at the heart of the Paris meeting.



EADV Specialist Course:

Skin Pigmentation in Universal Dermatology

On 10—11 February 2025, the picturesque city of Vilnius, Lithuania, hosted the EADV Specialist Course "Skin Pigmentation in Universal Dermatology". This expertly organised event brought together over 20 dermatologists from 10 countries to explore the intricate mechanisms of skin pigmentation, delve into emerging research and discuss innovative diagnostic and treatment approaches for pigmentation disorders.

The comprehensive two-day prolectures gramme featured renowned experts, including Christos C. Zouboulis, Mauro Picardo, Carmen Salavastru, Alessia Paganelli and Rūta Gancevičienė. Topics were wide ranging and included basic and modern understanding of melanocyte biology, UV radiation effects, clinical comprehension and current pharmacological and interventional manipulations for the main pigmentary skin conditions, abnormalities and diseases, cutting-edge therapies for conditions like vitiligo and melasma.

Practical sessions, led by Vilnius University Hospital Santaros Klinikos Head of Centre of Dermatovenereology Dr Tadas Raudonis and young specialists Agné Sausdravé and Jorinta Jokubaité were a highlight. These sessions offered hands-on experience with

EADV Fellowship

A report from the Regional Dermatology Training Centre, Moshi, Tanzania

I am sincerely grateful to the European Academy of Dermatology and Venereology (EADV) for granting me the opportunity to carry out a fellowship at the Regional Dermatology Training Centre (RDTC) in Moshi, Tanzania. This experience has been enriching, both professionally and personally.

My stay at RDTC has been exceptionally rewarding. The staff and faculty at the centre have been remarkably welcoming, dedicated and positive, creating an atmosphere that fosters learning and collaboration. RDTC is a regional hub for dermatology training and education in sub-Saharan Africa, offering a vibrant academic environment. During my time there, many residents were preparing their dissertations, and I had the privilege of attending numerous presentations of exciting and relevant local research projects.

Clinically, the fellowship has given me invaluable exposure to a broad spectrum of skin diseases in skin of colour, including conditions that are rare or considered exotic in Europe, such as leprosy, elephantiasis and Mpox. These clinical insights have broadened my diagnostic perspective and deepened my understanding of dermatologic diversity and tropical dermatology.

In addition to participating in daily clinics, I provided clinical support to the outpatient department and contributed actively to teaching activities. I gave lectures on medical mycology and trained residents daily in direct microscopy for the diagnosis of fungal infections. It was especially interesting and educational to discuss complex and challenging cases with colleagues in such a collaborative clinical environment.

One of RDTC's unique and essential missions is the treatment and prevention of precancerous lesions and skin cancer in people with albinism and patients with xeroderma pigmentosum. The centre runs outreach clinics supported by the International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS), where healthcare teams travel to remote regions to educate local communities about sun protection. During these visits, they distribute sunhats, sunscreen, and sunglasses, and provide clinical care. These efforts are crucial in reducing the burden of skin cancer in highly vulnerable populations (Fig. 1).

I was also actively involved in initiating and conducting a research project on Tinea capitis among schoolchildren. The study compared two sampling methods, assessed the prevalence of Tinea capitis in schoolchildren and identified the dermatophyte species involved. This project was carried out in close collaboration with PhD student Julia Shen from the Department of



Dermatology, Zealand University Hospital, Denmark, as well as Dr Agnes Kessy, Prof Daudi Mavura, and Dr Lilian M. Swai from RDTC. We enrolled 170 children. Approximately 60% were either asymptomatic carriers or had clinical signs of Tinea capitis (Fig. 2).

As part of the fellowship, I also contributed to the planning of two upcoming PhD projects:

- Dr Agnes Kessy, who will be conducting her PhD on Pityriasis versicolor.
- Dr Nelson Mosha, who will investigate Hidradenitis suppurativa for his PhD.

Both projects are of high relevance and are expected to strengthen the academic capacity at RDTC (Fig. 3). As a direct outcome of the mycology-focused PhD, a routine mycology laboratory has been established at the centre. This laboratory will play an important role in training young residents in essential diagnostic skills such as direct microscopy.

I also had the pleasure of discussing future research collaborations with Prof Faye, who is currently working at RDTC with support from ILDS. We have agreed to collaborate on future projects involving RDTC and his home institution in Mali, with a particular focus on fungal resistance, among other areas of shared interest.

I am deeply thankful to EADV for making this experience possible. It has been a unique opportunity to learn,

contribute and grow. I would also like to express my gratitude to the Department of Dermatology and Allergy, Herlev and Gentofte Hospital, Denmark, for granting me leave to pursue this fellowship. I return with new knowledge, skills and inspiration that I hope will benefit patients in Denmark and across Europe.

History of Dermatology Task Force

STEFAN GHEORGHE NICOLAU

Intramuscular injections are not pleasant and, with children, advanced explaining – perhaps even inducement - may be necessary to encourage them to receive them. Discomfort and pain aside, other more severe complications can potentially follow intramuscular injections. One of these is the Nicolau syndrome – embola cutis medicamentosa – a rare disorder that was described in detail by Prof Stefan Gheorghe Nicolau in 1925¹. It would appear that the online citation for this paper is erroneous, as he was Nicolau SG, rather than Nicolau P, but the article clearly states his name, academic title and his affiliation.

Stefan Gheorghe Nicolau was born in the erstwhile petrol city of Ploiesti in southern Romania on 10 June 1874. His early formative school years appear to have been spent there2. Following this, he moved to the capital Bucharest where he was admitted to the Faculty of Medicine in 1893². He graduated from the Bucharest Faculty of Medicine in 18993 (This medical school had been founded just 30 years earlier on 12 November 1869, under the leadership Dr Carol Davila and bears his name4). His thesis was on leprosy, a topic he would continue to pursue throughout his career.

He left Romania in 1899 to continue his education in France and studied under such luminaries as Louis-Anne-Jean Brocq (1856-1928), Jean Alfred Fournier (1832-1915) and Francois Henri Hallopeau (1842-1919)³. He later trained under Josef Jadassohn (1863-1936) in Berne, Switzerland³.

Nicolau syndrome


The eponymous Nicolau synembolia drome. or cutis medicamentosa, may follow intramuscular, subcutaneous or even intra-articular injections. Its exact pathophysiology is unknown. It manifests as livedoid erythematous or purplish macules on the skin with or without acute pain. Progression to purpura, ulceration and necrosis, which sometimes extends to the deeper underlying tissues may occur. Limb ischemia, posamputation, sibly causing superinfection, and sometimes paresis or paralysis with neuropathic pain are potential sequelae^{6,7}.

Nicolau returned to Romania in 1905 and was employed under Prof Mihail

Petrini-Galati² at the clinic of "Dermatology and Syphiligraphy" in Bucharest. He would continue his previously established collaboration with other doyens of Romanian medicine such as Victor Babes (1854-1926), one of the founders of modern bacteriology and lon Cantacuzinno (1863-1934), another great microbiologist^{2,3}. He became professor of dermatology at the University in Cluj (1919-1920), later returning to the Faculty of Medicine at Bucharest in 1920.

He is credited with being a founder of the Romanian Society of Dermatology (1928), the journal of the Romanian Society of Dermatology (1929) as "Bulletin de la Societe Roumaine de Dermatologie et de Syphiligraphie", the Ministry of Health's Centre for Dermatology and the first Romanian Textbook of dermatology "Manualul unic de dermatologie" (Single Manual of Dermatology). He created a vaccine for lymphogranuloma venerum and worked on syphilis, including a serologic method for its diagnosis⁵. He was elected Full Member of the Romanian Academy in 1938, one of the highest academic distinctions in Romania

Although there is debate about whether Freudenthal first discovered the disorder, it is named after Nicolau, who was the first to make clear and detailed descriptions¹. Stefan Gheorghe Nicolau mentioned the works of others such as Brocq and Freudenthal in his seminal paper¹. These works did not fully



describe the syndrome that now bears Nicolau's name eponymously.

Stefan Gheorghe Nicolau died on 3 November 1970 in Bucharest.

that the specialties of dermatology and venereology are separate and have their own medical communities and faculties. But, as in Europe, we are united in the provision of excellent care for patients and championing clinical and academic advances.

I am honoured to represent the UK at EADV. I have a special interest in psychodermatyology. So, my research links are very much with psychiatrists, psychologists and mental-health researchers (e.g. epidemiologists).

I work very closely with the European Society for Dermatology and Psychiatry (ESDaP) www.psychodermatology.net and its current President Prof Laurent. I was president of ESDaP a few years ago and, whilst ESDaP is predominantly European, it has become truly global, largely because we (together with US and other colleagues) have developed a global network of psychodermatology research and clinical excellence. For example, we have recently held the first World Psychodermatology Congress in Istanbul, Turkey,www.esdap25-wcpd.com). The work of ESDaP is very much linked to that of EADV; there are several EADV task forces which are specifically interested in the psychological wellbeing of patients: The Psychodermatology Task Force (which I currently lead), the Pruritus Task Force and the Quality of Life Task Force.

I am originally from Liverpool (city of music and football). I graduated from Bristol University and trained in the UK and New Zealand. I am a Consultant Dermatologist in London and an Honorary Professor of Dermatology at Queen Mary University, London. As a dermatologist with over a decade of leadership experience in national professional bodies – including six

years as Vice President and eight as President – I have always believed that our profession must shape its own future.
