Two-thousand-and-twenty-five has also been a pivotal year for the Academy's evolution. We proudly reached over 13,000 members across 134 countries, a testament to EADV's

Among the many memorable moments of the Congress, one that resonated deeply was our Plenary Session keynote lecture by Lucy Cooke, acclaimed zoologist, author and National Geographic explorer. In her talk, *"Live like a sloth, think like an octopus: Lessons from nature's greatest survivors,"* Lucy explored how unconscious bias has shaped our understanding of the natural world. Her message - that resilience and adaptability can take many unexpected forms - offered an inspiring parallel to our field, where innovation and open-mindedness drive progress every day.

growing global impact and the trust our community places in our mission. This year, we undertook an important revision of our **Vision and Mission statements**, reaffirming the Academy's commitment to leading progress in dermatology and venereology.

Global recognition and advocacy

In Europe, our advocacy work reached new levels of visibility and impact.

Together, we have submitted two joint letters to DG SANTE and DG JUST, calling for stronger EU-wide rules on sunbed use - a pressing public health issue too long overlooked.

This is not just a medical issue - it is a matter of public health and consumer safety.

Through our European Parliament event, "Beyond the Glow: The Harmful Effects of Sunbeds on Public Health," we continue to gather policymakers and leading cancer and dermatology

organisations to push for concrete action. It is time for Europe to act.

This year also brought historic recognition for our specialty. The World Health Assembly officially acknowledged skin diseases as a global public health priority, marking a turning point for millions of patients worldwide.

With over 4.69 billion incident cases globally, skin and subcutaneous diseases are among the top ten causes of disability. EADV fully supports the development of a Global Plan of Action on public health responses to skin diseases, reinforcing our advocacy for improved care, education and access across all regions.

Representing EADV worldwide

In 2025, the Academy was also proudly represented on the global stage. We continued our engagement in international collaboration with the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL) in Jaipur, India, the American Academy of Dermatology (AAD) Annual meeting and Summer Innovation Academy, Canadian Dermatology Association (CDA-ADC) 100th Anniversary, Korean Dermatological Association (KDA), Japanese Dermatological Association (JDA), MEIDAM and ILDS in Cape Town, South Africa. These exchanges

strengthen our shared Europe commitment to advancing the specialty through science, education, and solidarity including our ongoing partnerships with ESDR, EDF and IUSTI Europe.

Looking ahead

As we move into 2026, our collective energy and achievements in Paris set the tone for what lies ahead. The success of this Congress and of this remarkable year is a reflection of each of you: Our members, speakers, partners and staff.

Thank you for your dedication, your curiosity and your belief in the mission of our Academy. Together, we continue to build a future where dermatology and venereology thrive as pillars of global health and patient care.

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Editorial

A winter fairy tale

Dermatology and venereology is a medical specialty known for having few Europewide specialisation slots, especially in dermatology departments. This can be greatly demotivating and may be a factor in a young physician's decision to not join our specialty. I have employed young physicians from university and who have been active in my research laboratories for many years. There has never been a need to advertise open slots. Until now. A recent structural change meant I announced just one. I unexpectedly had hundreds of applications. It was like a fairy tale!

Over the past decade, dermatology has become one of the most attractive medical specialties, an interest driven by a combination of professional, personal and societal factors. One of the most significant reasons for dermatology's appeal is its favourable work/life balance. Compared to many other medical specialties, dermatology often offers more predictable working hours, fewer night shifts and limited emergency duties.

Dermatology also combines medical, surgical and aesthetic aspects to offer daily diversity in practice.

Dermatologists manage chronic inflammatory diseases, diagnose and treat skin cancers, perform procedural interventions and increasingly engage in cosmetic treatments. This broad scope allows physicians to tailor their practice to their individual interests, enhancing long-term job satisfaction.

Technological and scientific advancements have further increased the specialty's attractiveness. Innovations such as biologic therapies, laser treatments and digital diagnostic tools have transformed dermatology into a highly dynamic and research-driven field. Young physicians are drawn to a specialty that offers opportunities to participate in cutting-edge research and clinical trials.

Economic factors also play an important role. Dermatology is often associated with stable income prospects and flexible career models, including private practice, group practices, hospital-based work and academic careers. The possibility of combining clinical dermatology with aesthetic medicine can further enhance financial security.

Finally, the strong patient–physician

relationship in dermatology contributes to its appeal. Many skin diseases are visible and significantly impact patients' quality of life. Effective treatment often leads to rapid and tangible improvements, providing a sense of accomplishment and meaningful patient impact.

Dermatology's increasing attractiveness among young physicians reflects broader changes in medical career expectations. Its combination of work/life balance, clinical diversity, innovation, economic stability and patient-centred care makes dermatology a highly desirable and future-oriented specialty. This is not a fairy tale but the wonderful truth!

Another record-breaking attendance at EADV Congress

The EADV Congress was held this year in the so-called "City of Lights", Paris, France, between 17 and 20 September 2025. And it again proved to be an exceptional event, attracting 20,108 participants from 142 countries, making it our most successful Congress ever. There were 4,097 accepted abstracts.

The EADV Congress once again had a four-day outstanding programme including keynote

Psychodermatology: What is it?

Psychodermatology (psychocutaneous medicine) is a field at the interface of dermatology and psychiatry, involving dermatologists, psychologists, psychiatrists, psychosomaticians, paediatricians and their teams (see *JEADV* 2023;37:2419-2427). Consequently, only healthcare professionals are authorised to practice psychodermatology and teach it.

Considering social and psychological factors

Experts working in the field of psychodermatology recognise that many skin conditions have a psychological component and base their work - both clinical and research - on the biopsychosocial model of disease and health. This model considers social and psychological factors in addition to biological factors to partly explain disease symptoms. Additionally, skin diseases can have important psychological consequences. Psychodermatology therefore advocates a

multidisciplinary approach to the treatment of skin patients in whom psychological factors seem to play a role.

Skin symptoms and psychological factors

Skin diseases for which correlations between the occurrence of the disease and/or the severity of skin symptoms and psychological factors such as anxiety or depression have been shown include - but are not limited to - atopic dermatitis, psoriasis, seborrhic dermatitis, acne, chronic urticaria and chronic prurigo. There

is also a relationship between psychological stress and symptoms of skin diseases. It is supposed that under stress, patients with skin disorders develop dysfunctional coping methods, such as catastrophising thoughts, which may contribute to a worsening of the disease. There are some specific psychodermatological disorders where the role of psychological disorders is huge in the pathophysiology of skin lesions (like dermatitis artefacta or skin picking syndrome) or sensory skin disorders (like delusional parasitosis or burning mouth syndrome).

Taking a psychodermatological approach

The psychodermatological approach aims to identify associations between psychological factors and signs of skin conditions in patients with skin diseases to offer and apply certain psychological therapies or interventions to these patients. Interventions comprise cognitive behavioural therapies, psychodynamic therapies, mindfulness-based interventions, stress management and relaxation trainings, among others.

Psychodermatology in Europe

In Europe, psychodermatology is organised under the umbrella of [EADV's Psychodermatology Task Force](#) and the [European Society for Dermatology and Psychiatry](#) (ESDaP), which are closely associated.

Training and events

There is a psychodermatology diploma, which is only open to dermatologists, psychiatrists and

psychologists: <https://www.psychodermatology.net/about-7>.

An international classification of psychodermatological disorders under the auspices of ESDaP, EADV and APMNA (Association for Psychocutaneous Medicine of North America) has been published ([JADV 2024;38:645-656](https://doi.org/10.1016/j.jeadv.2024.03.010)).

The recent EADV Congress in Paris, France, was also the [1st World Psychodermatology Congress](#). The next ESDaP congress will take place in 2028 in Wroclaw, Poland, and a symposium in association with the British Association of Dermatologists (BAD) will be soon held in Manchester, UK, (30 June-1 July 2026).

The ESDaP Executive Committee and EADV Psychodermatology Task

Force have recently warned about the lies and dangers associated with certain cosmetics. An editorial will be published in the *JADV* and a commentary on the definition of neurocosmetics and the use of cosmetics in psychodermatology will be published in *Clin Dermatol*, in association with APMNA.

Through ESDaP studies, supported by our task force, research and collaboration between European countries have reached unprecedented levels. The ESDaP I study resulted in 16 publications and the ESDaP II study has led to nine publications so far. The ESDaP III study will begin shortly.

It is particularly satisfying to see the growing recognition of psychodermatology by the entire dermatology

community and the current revival of this approach with the arrival of many young colleagues.





Eugene (Jenő) Follmann



1898–1977

Eugene (Jenő) Follmann (1898-1977) was an Hungarian dermatologist and dermatopathologist who practiced dermatology and dermatopathology for over a half century on two continents: Europe and South America. He published well into his seventies and is most remembered for the balanitis that bears his name, an uncommon manifestation of primary syphilis that can pose a diagnostic challenge to today's clinician.

Eugene Follmann was born in Budapest, Hungary, and attended the University of Pázmány Péter, Budapest (1924). He worked at the Department of Dermatology of the University of Erzsébet, Pecs, Hungary (1923–1938). He received a PhD in 1935 ("Doctor of Science"). During the 1940s, Eugene Follmann held the title of Associate Professor, Chief Physician, of the Dermatology section of the Outpatient Clinic of the Hungarian State Employees Health

Insurance Fund (OBTA), Budapest. He published at least 18 contributions while in Hungary, the most recognised being his 1948 presentation on syphilitic balanitis (1), although he references his earlier publications on this topic in 1931 and 1939.

In 1948, Eugene Follmann, his wife Victoria and two sons, Zsolt and Eugene emigrated to Buenos Aires, Argentina, aboard the ship Campana. In his 1973 book, entitled *Human Melanin* (2), he lists his academic title

as "Director of Investigative Laboratory of Clinic of Dermatology, University of Buenos Aires" as well as six other professorships and academic titles he had held in Pecs (Budapest), Kolozsvár (Hungary), Buenos Aires (Argentina), Paris (France) and Berlin (Germany). He published over 40 papers in Argentine dermatology journals often in *Revista Argentina de Dermatología (Dermatología Argentina)*. He died in Buenos Aires in 1977.

Follmann balanitis

The term "balanitis" is derived from the Greek *balanos* meaning "acorn" and refers to the inflammation of the glans penis which is shaped like an acorn. One interesting, but uncommon manifestation of primary syphilis is Follmann balanitis. It can present as a balanitis with or without an accompanying chancre or lymphadenopathy. Clinical findings include papules and plaques on the glans or erosions and crusted lesions with edematous changes. The balanitis may be painful and has been sometimes reported to occur in the setting of secondary syphilis.

The balanitis is named in honour of Eugene Follmann who first described it.
