

Mature Skin

Specialist Course | 3-5 June 2026 | Bucharest, Romania

Description

Over 30% of patients seeing dermatologists are over 65, and more than half are older than 50 years of age. Over time, there are changes in the immune system and the skin barrier to favor the development of dermatitis, while management can be more complicated with comorbid conditions and medications. Older age may also be accompanied by changes in pharmacokinetics or pharmacodynamics, or both that may alter drug safety and efficacy profiles.

These factors contribute to the greater likelihood of adverse drug reactions in older adults. The goal of this course is to provide practicing dermatologists a foundation of the pathophysiologic mechanisms driving various skin diseases in older patients, diagnostic tools to make the diagnosis, as well as optimal management strategies accounting for age and comorbidities. Along with the inflammatory skin diseases and their particularities in the geriatric patient, the programme will address skin cancer prevention and treatment and their integration into the concept of “well ageing”.
